

KIA ORA PHARMILY WHĀNAU!




So let's recap what we have done thus far.

Since late 2020, APSA has successfully joined the International Pharmaceutical Students' Federation (IPSF), a global organisation dedicated to enhancing public health through information, education, networking, and various professional initiatives for pharmacy and pharmaceutical students.

To ensure effective communication, contact persons from each organisation act as a bridge between the university and IPSF, facilitating constant updates and collaboration. As the CP, I actively contributed throughout the year by preparing multiple reports, creating an introductory video of APSA to share with IPSF members, and participating in several meetings.





Due to being a new member and facing the challenges of the Covid-19 pandemic, APSA initially struggled to raise awareness about IPSF within its community. In early 2023, the APSA IPSF sub-community was established under IPSF representatives, facilitating more accessible communication within APSA. This April, we held an official introduction session for IPSF, marking APSA's first in-person event dedicated to IPSF. To foster further interest and engagement, I reached out to IPSF members from foreign countries and asked them to record videos describing their roles and experiences, which were played during the event. This interactive approach allowed around 35 students to connect with their international counterparts and generated a greater interest in APSA.

Looking ahead to the second half of the year, the plan is to establish collaborations with members from other countries, such as Singapore and the UK. These collaborative events will serve as practical opportunities to strengthen the international connections of APSA members! We are to work further on restrictions in an exchange programme that IPSF runs, to hopefully initiate the programme in close time for the students to experience unique pharmacy fields in different countries. IPSF is an organisation that has full potential to grow in future APSA cohorts:)
