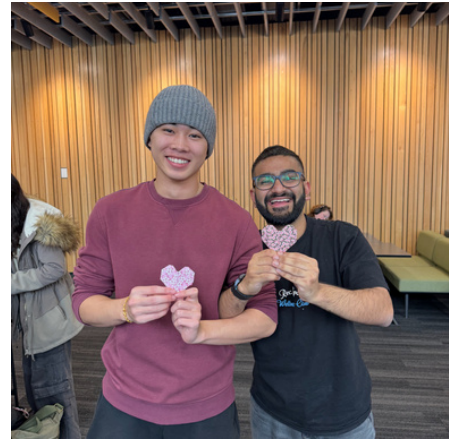

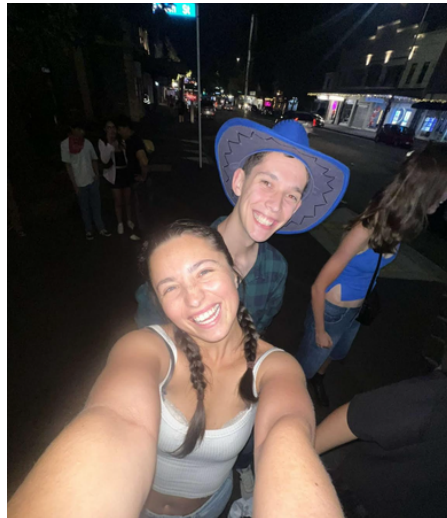

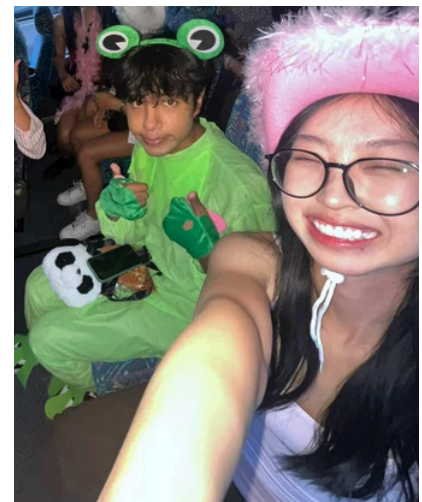
As we wrap up the first half of our final year, we want to say a massive well done to everyone!

Some of us even attended APPS MSIA where we placed in competitions, learnt various things from workshops, and made many new friends along the way!

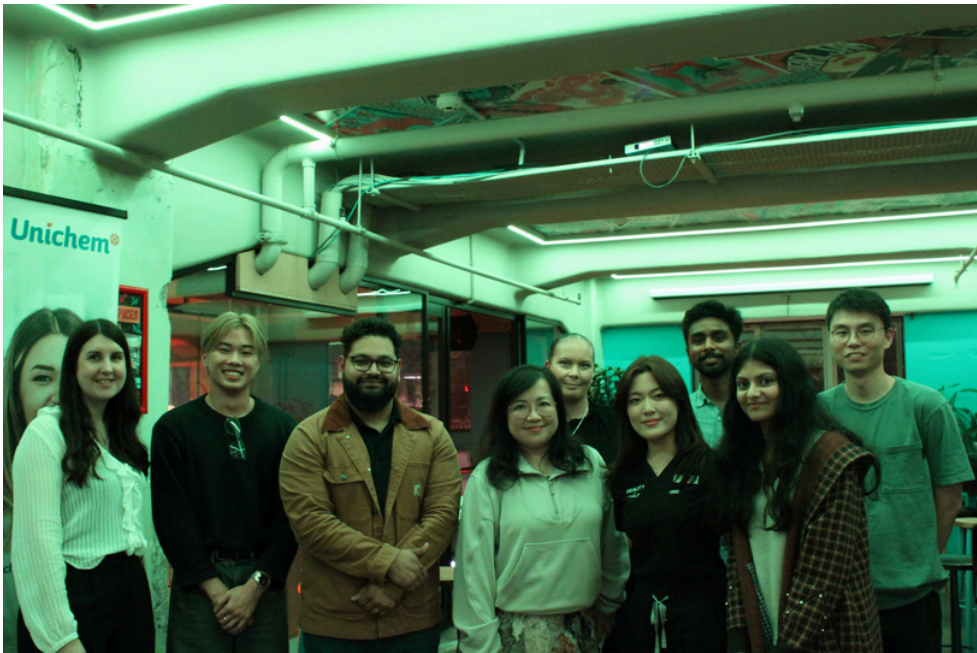

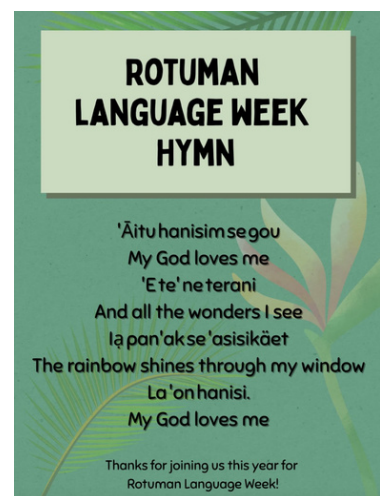
Talofa lava, Mālō e lelei, Kia orana, Bula vinaka, Fakaalofa lahi atu! Kia ora whānau!

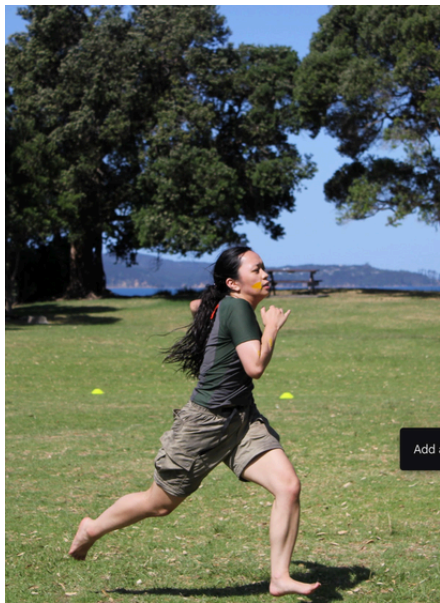


Kia ora koutou!

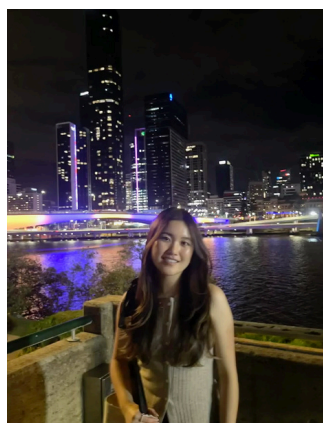
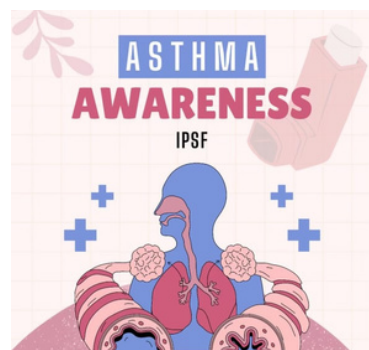

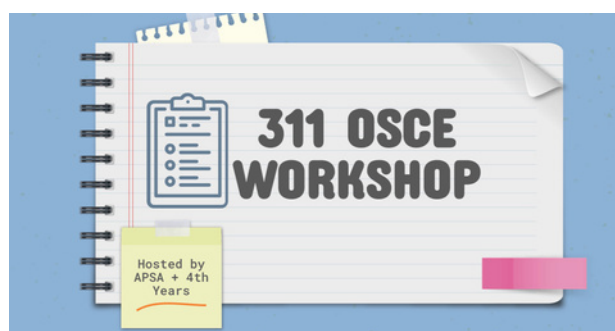
Can't believe Semester One is already over!
